LLOYD H. CARR

ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR AND FORMER
HEAD FOOTBALL COACH UNIVERSITY OF
MICHIGAN – ATHLETICS

Lloyd Carr became Associate Athletic Director in 2008 after completing his 13-year career as Michigan's head football coach with a victory over No. 9 Florida in the 2008 Capital One Bowl. Carr compiled a 122-40 overall record during his career. He guided U-M to the 1997 national championship and five Big Ten Conference crowns.

A member of the Wolverine football staff for 28 years, Carr served 15 years under Bo Schembechler (1980-89) and Gary Moeller (1990-94) initially as defensive secondary coach, became the defensive coordinator, and then moved into the position of assistant head coach before becoming head coach in 1995.

Beyond the football field, Carr has been involved in many charitable causes. He has endowed a women's athletics scholarship, initiated the Women's Football Academy and U-M Men's Fantasy Football Experience which benefit the University of Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Center, and the "Carr Wash for Kids" to benefit the University of Michigan C.S. Mott Children's and Women's Hospital. He also serves as a spokesperson for Mentor Michigan to help recruit men and women to help children in



need. He is involved with local charities such as the Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra, Shelter Association of Washtenaw County, Washtenaw Literacy and United Way and annually hosts the Hall-of-Fame football camp in his home town of Riverview.

Carr began his coaching career as a high school assistant at Nativity High in Detroit (1968-69) and at Belleville (Michigan) High School from 1970-73. He was head coach at John Glenn High School (Westland, Michigan) from 1973-75, earning Regional Class A Coach of the Year honors in 1975. His collegiate coaching career started with two seasons at Eastern Michigan (1976-77), followed by two seasons at Illinois (1978-79) before arriving at the U-M.

He graduated from Northern Michigan University 1968 with a B.S. in education and a Master's in education administration in 1970. He received an honorary degree from Albion College in 2008.

Carr has received numerous accolades and awards including being inducted into multiple Halls of Fame and receiving various coaching honors, including the 1997 National Coach of the Year, the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year, and others from the Walter Camp Football Foundation, American Football Coaches Association, Football News, Maxwell Football Club, Woody Hayes, the Paul "Bear" Bryant, the R. R. Neyland Memorial Award from the Knoxville Quarterback Club and the Philip Hart Public Service Award and the Dodge National Athletic Lifetime Achievement Award.

Lloyd and his wife Laurie have six children and 11 grandchildren.

JIM J. SYGO

MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES
AND ENVIRONMENT DEPUTY DIRECTOR

Jim J. Sygo was appointed Deputy Director of Environmental Protection in the newly created Department of Natural Resources and Environment in January 2010. As Deputy Director, he has oversight of the Air Quality Division, Groundwater Division, and Remediation Division. He was most recently the Deputy Director of the Department of Environmental Quality since May 25, 2003, with oversight of the Water Bureau, Land and Water Management Division, Waste and Hazardous Materials Division, Air Quality Division, Remediation and Redevelopment Division, Office of Geological Survey, and Office of Pollution Prevention and Compliance Assistance. Prior to that he was the Division Chief of the Remediation and Redevelopment Division and, prior to the department's reorganization in September 2002, he was the Division Chief of the Waste Management Division. As Division Chief, he has administered the statewide programs for the cleanup of contaminated sites and for the management of hazardous waste, solid waste, liquid industrial waste, pollution incident plans, and groundwater discharges.

Sygo has been with the Department of Natural Resources and Environment (formerly the Department of Environmental Quality [DEQ]) since becoming a water quality specialist in the Saginaw District in 1983. He was named Saginaw District Supervisor of

Waste Management Division programs in 1987, Region II Waste Management Supervisor in Roscommon in 1989, and Region III Waste Management Supervisor for the southern half of the Lower Peninsula in 1990.

Sygo, has a bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan in meteorology and oceanography and a master's degree in oceanography also from U of M. He worked for the Department of State Police as a health physicist before joining the DEQ. Prior to joining the State Police, Sygo worked for Spicer Engineering in Saginaw, and Black and Veatch in Detroit as a consultant and as a water quality management planner for the East Central Michigan Planning and Development Region.



JOHN MCCULLOCH

John McCulloch served for 10 years as a member of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners prior to being elected Drain Commissioner in 2001. His title changed to Water Resources Commissioner in November, 2008. He was Chairman of the Board of Commissioners for five years and served for eight years on the Drainage Board. An attorney and certified public accountant, Commissioner McCulloch has authored numerous articles on water quality that have appeared in both national and international journals and publications.
